Attendance:

Regular attendance at school is critical to ensure your child has continuity in their learning and relationships with their peers. We monitor attendance closely at MIS as we strongly encourage every student to be at school at least 90% of the time. We have achieved 95% in the first two weeks of school ... the challenge will now be to sustain it.

Please find below important information below from the Ministry of Education:

If a student misses one day of school every two weeks, they miss a whole year of school by 16 years of age. As a parent or caregiver, you, alongside our school, play a key role in building strong habits of regular school attendance. All students are legally required to attend school every day and it is a shared responsibility to make sure students attend and engage in learning from when they first start school. As we enter 2024, every day of school matters.

You must let the school know if your child is going to be absent for a day or intends to be absent for a portion of the school term for whatever reason, like a tangi or medical procedure. Family holidays or taking time off for extracurricular activities (not organised by school) are not acceptable reasons for being absent.

If you're struggling at home with getting your child to school, talk to us! Our school is committed to supporting your child to attend school and building a culture that fosters excellent attendance by having:

- School staff who have strong relationships with students and whānau.
- A school culture that recognises your child and your family for who they are, where they come from and who they want to be.
- A school community that does everything to make sure students are at school, and they are participating, and progressing in their education.

Phones Away for the Day (new Government Policy):

As most of you will be aware, the Government has implemented a new policy regarding phones in schools. The policy states:

The regulations require that schools must ensure students do not use or access a phone while they are attending school, including during lunch time and breaks. This includes students who are on a school course or visit outside the school grounds.

This must be in effect no later than the start of Term 2, 29 April 2024.

MIS already has a policy in place that meets these requirements. Your child should by now have signed our policy about phones and smart watches at school. The key message is that anyone carrying a phone on them to/from school must hand this in to their classroom teacher to have it stored in the office for the day. The phone will be returned to the students after 2.50 p.m.

Reading, Writing and Maths in Schools (Gvt Policy)

From the beginning of Term 1 2024, schools and kura with students in years 0-8 will spend an average of one hour a day teaching each reading, writing, and maths, pānui, tuhituhi, and pāngarau. This could be in dedicated lessons and in other learning areas as students read, write, and engage with maths in a variety of purposes and contexts.

Teachers will deliberately and purposefully dedicate time to teaching these core skills. Teaching techniques like investigations, collaborative learning, and games will continue to be used so students stay engaged with their learning.

This change sets a clear expectation that all year 0-8 students should receive regular, focussed instruction in these core areas. Many schools and kura are already teaching an hour of reading, writing, and maths each day.

Learning to read, write, and do maths is important in everything we do. Daily teaching has been shown to lift student progress, when coupled with a high-quality curriculum taught using evidence-informed teaching practices.

At MIS our mission is:

To provide opportunities for students to learn and grow in ways that acknowledge and value emerging adolescence.

As a teaching staff we work hard to ensure dedicated and explicit instruction is provided in each learning area, responsive to students needs. We also acknowledge there are times when an integrated approach is most valuable so that learning can be achieved through relevant contexts.

In January during our call back days teachers discussed ways to maximise learning time to ensure we meet the requirement of explicit instruction one hour per day (average). Teachers have compiled classroom timetables to reflect how we are going to achieve this. NB: it does look slightly different in each classroom due to the specialist subject timetable. Please note that all specialist classes have a dedicated English/Mathematics focus also.

Learning is most valuable when it is cohesive across a range of contexts and we believe we do this very well already, but we have reviewed our practices and tweaked them accordingly.

School Swimming Sports Festival:

Our school swimming sports festival will be taking place at the Morrinsville Rec. Grounds on Friday 23rd February. Students will either swim in the competitive or non-competitive races. Students have entered events via the student notices and all students have been given a notice this week to bring home detailing how the day will run and what is required. The schedule of events can be found on our school Facebook page.

Swimming sports is a fun day out and families are very welcome to come along and support the swimmers. There will be a sausage sizzle running on the day with sausages and drinks available for purchase for \$2 each. The pool canteen will not be open.

School Fees and Donations:

Our School Board has opted into the School Donations Scheme for 2024 which is available to schools in Decile 1-7 to help cover costs historically incurred by families. The School Board does not require families to pay fees towards day-to-day operations. However, we do ask that a fee of \$40 is payable to cover the cost of the take home component for <u>Hard Materials and Art</u>. Despite the increasing cost of materials to the school the Board is mindful of ensuring we keep the fees as low as possible and so will not be increasing the fee this year.

<u>Hat fee:</u> a fee of \$10 is charged to all school families for the use of the school hat (worn in Terms 1/4). The fee covers some of the purchase cost and also the laundering costs.

Families are welcome to pay the \$50.00 fee from now on. Our school bank account number is: 06-0369-0928976-00. Please include your child's name and 'school fees' as a reference. *All families who pay the \$50 fees by the end of Term One, will go in the draw to win a \$100 grocery voucher.* Alternatively, families are welcome to set up an automatic payment to pay the fees off.

There are some things that will still require payment by parents e.g. out-of-hours music tuition, sports trips and overnight camps (which are all voluntary extra-curricular activities).

Policy Review:

Policy Review is an important component of our school organisation, and consultation process. We are a SchoolDocs school which means we work with SchoolDocs to provide us with a comprehensive set of policies which have been well researched and follow the Ministry of Education National Administration Guidelines. Head Lice:

We have had a case of head lice detected at school this week. Our school policy states that the treatment of headlice is the responsibility of parents/caregivers; therefore we request that all parents check their child's hair and treat, if required, as soon as possible. If you require information regarding head lice treatment please contact your local pharmacy. Thank you for your assistance.

Measles: ... a notice from the Public Health Nurse (Keren Johnston)

Te Whatu Ora have recently released a warning to all unvaccinated Kiwis not to travel overseas as measles cases increase across the globe. Measles is highly infectious and cases have been recently reported in Australia, the United Kingdom, the United States and across Asia and the Middle East. All New Zealanders should make sure they are fully immunised against measles if they plan to travel overseas.

Aotearoa New Zealand is at very high risk of a measles outbreak. There's a risk of getting measles if you have not had 2 vaccinations, or have not already had measles. The measles (MMR) vaccine is free for all children in NZ, and all adults over the age of 18 who are eligible for free NZ healthcare. Adults born before 1969 are not required to have an MMR vaccine – as they are considered to be immune to measles.

To avoid schools from having to close if an outbreak does occur, we are encouraging all schools to update their vaccination records with copies of vaccine certificates. We are also encouraging staff who work at the school to be aware of their vaccination status and to get the MMR vaccination if required.

Action: if you haven't already given us a copy of your child's vaccine certificate can you urgently provide us with one so we can get our register up-to-date.
